JOB MARKET PAPER

“A necessary and sufficient condition for a Perfect Bayesian Folk Theorem”

This paper studies repeated games of incomplete information where each player knows his own payoffs and where the unknown state of the world can be identified by the combined private information of all players. We obtain a condition that is both necessary and sufficient for a Perfect Bayesian Equilibrium (PBE) folk theorem to hold. This contrasts with the existing literature where, due to the difficulty in keeping track of beliefs as play evolves, the analysis has focused on either one-sided incomplete information or has dealt with various ex-post solution concepts. Finally, as an intermediate step to proving our result, we show the condition obtained is also necessary and sufficient to obtain Ex-Post folk theorems.

“Identifying subjective beliefs in subjective state space models” 2009.

Since Savage and De Finetti's pioneering works, decision theory has put an emphasis on subjective representations, focusing on three main objects: tastes, as represented by Bernoulli utilities over pure outcomes, state spaces and beliefs. However, to the best of my knowledge, all decision theoretic models written have succeeded in obtaining (meaningful) subjective representations for at most two of the previous three objects. This paper takes the Dekel-Lipman-Rustichini model, arguably the most general framework in which both the tastes and state space are subjectively derived from preferences, and shows that for an interesting class of preferences one can also identify beliefs over the state space.
